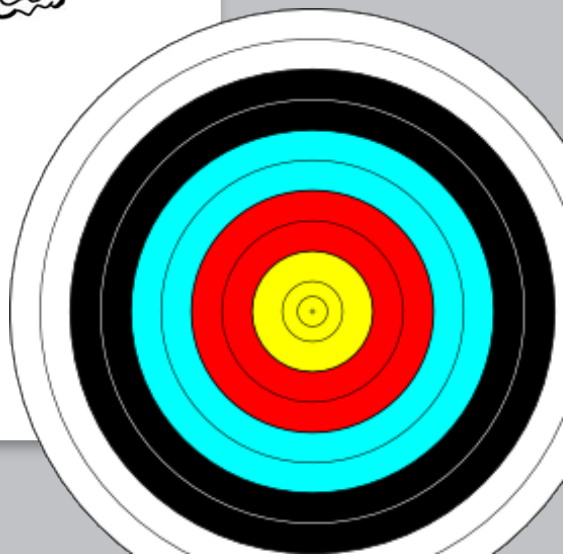

Cliff has taken up gardening, his latest bloom (see pictures) has a certain flair.

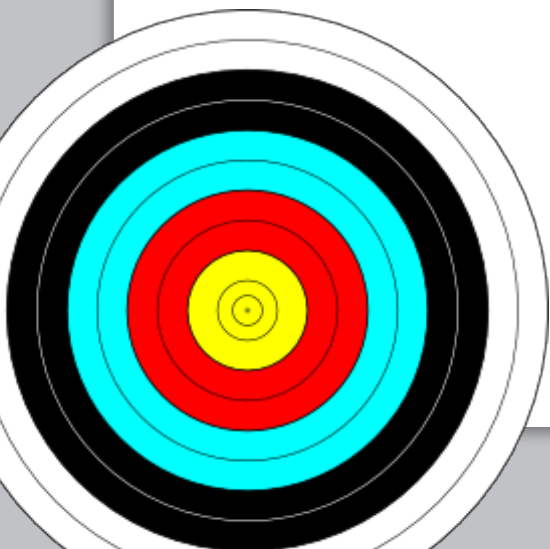
So this is what happens when your arrow hits an immovable object, like an steel girder.

Our annual funshoot made its return, sadly without the mince pies and sweets. Social distancing also was considered, so that left and right handed archers were never "face to face".

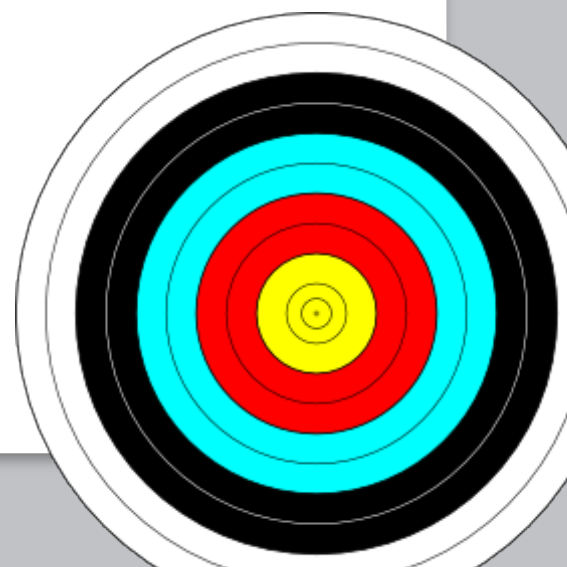

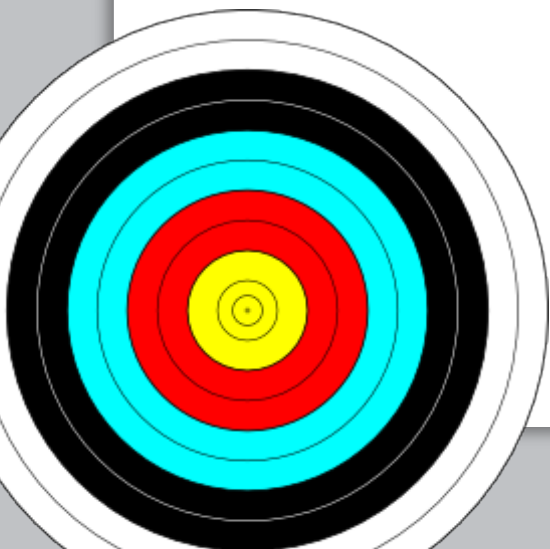
A visit by the Elf and Safety officer ensured that we upheld the shooting rules. His eye for detail meant he got up and personal with the arrows.
