

OPEN DAY AT LUTTERWORTH SPORTS CENTRE


On Saturday 10th December Lutterworth Sports Centre held an open day, the public were invited to come in see what we do and if they were interested to find out more about archery and our club.

Whilst shooting Cliff achieved all golds with a 6 arrow end, well



WORCESTER EXTERNAL SHOOT

As not everyone will have experienced this, Charles has kindly given us an insight in his own words as to what it's like and what happens at an external shoot.

'A Sunday morning in December saw me shooting a Worcester at the Foxes Archery club.

I understand that winning is neigh on impossible, but competing externally is the place I shoot at my best.

I don't know if it's the pace of the shoot or the sense of concentration coming from the other archers, what ever it is, I enjoy it.

Also, a good chance of a natter with others I have got to know over the years.

What happens on an external shoot?

Just as at the club shooting is controlled by a whistle so is this shoot. We tend to shoot in details, which means there are four people on one boss shooting in pairs. You record your score as we do at the club.

Yes, you do have to pay an entry fee, but if you enjoy the shoot and recording your scores, then it is worth it'.

WOULD YOU LIKE TO BECOME A QUALIFIED ARCHERY COACH?





What's it all about?



Have you ever thought about being an Archery Coach? Our club needs to increase the number of qualified and active coaches to be involved in activities such as Beginner's Courses, Have-a-Go sessions and to support members.

Archery GB have issued the following recent statement concerning coaching:

'Having a recognised coaching qualification provides assurance to the people you work with that you are competent and professional but also trained in safeguarding and with the appropriate practices and checks in place, which is of huge importance for all clubs, coaches and archers. By becoming a trained and qualified coach, you will learn about how and what to coach under the guidance of experienced coach educators and have access to the latest approaches in coaching. This will help you gain the skills and knowledge to motivate and progress archers, from beginners to high performance archers as well as develop your own coaching journey....'

The method of training coaches within the sport has changed and is continuing to evolve, so it is important for those involved in coaching to evolve as well by continuing to keep up to date with the latest thinking. There is no substitute for practical coaching and learning from other coaches, sharing experiences and issues.

With this in mind, Archery GB have developed a new approach and updated the qualifications. The first step on the coaching ladder is that of a Session Coach (the old Level 1). The next step is a Development Coach (old Level 2) which is open to those already qualified as a Session Coach.

Both courses have been structured into modules which also breaks down the cost into more manageable sections. There is some assistance available with the cost of these courses in the form of grants from various organisations including Harborough Council, but be aware. Some grants need to be applied for before the course starts and are only paid out on successful completion.

What do I have to do?



What are the modules?

Here is a summary of the modules to be taken for the Session Coach:

SESSION COACH:

The first 4 modules are completed by distance learning i.e. you can complete these in the comfort of your own home and at your own pace. Once you have completed a module, you can work with your mentor to practice your coaching. All the time you spend coaching or with your mentor is recorded for your final module.

- Starting Your Coaching Journey (online 2 x 2hrs) This module identifies simple yet musthave skills for coaches, including how to use reflection and feedback to take action towards improvement. It teaches coaches to use a "Plan - Do - Review" method of teaching
- Empowering Archery Part 1 (online 2 x 2hrs) Empowering Archery™ focuses on how to optimise people's experiences of archery and help them achieve their goals.
- Introduction to Technique (online 2 x 2hrs) From a coach's perspective, understanding the basics of shooting form and teaching these to your beginners from the first session is really important.
- Creating Engaging Sessions (online 2 x 2hrs) This module invites coaches to explore how they can create sessions that meet their audience's needs.

The next 2 modules are completed by attending a training day with your instructor.

- Using your Coaching Skills (in-person 1 day) This module helps coaches to apply what they have learnt on the course, with a focus on using drills and skills to improve the quality of practice for archers.
- Supported Practice and Coach Presentation (in-person 1 day) Coaches are asked to practice their coaching (for example at their club), which can start with a mentor, as soon as they have completed a module of the course. After getting enough practice, coaches return for the final day ready to provide a sample coaching session with peers on the course. We're not expecting perfection, as this is all about learning, and applying what they have learned from the other modules.

So how do I apply and access the course?

- 1. In order to complete the course, you will require access to your AGB members' portal, which you need for numerous reasons including accessing coaching training (plus open webinar/courses etc)
- You can log on by going to https://gb.sport80.com or, (if you have never used this portal 2. before you can e-mail the word 'Activate' to membership@achery.org or ask for further support using the same e-mail address).
- Read through the full requirements of the qualification for the desired level i.e Session 3. Coach or Development Coach.
- To help discount the cost of coach training, check out what bursaries (if any) are available 4. from County/Regional Archery association; local councils / funding bodies and Active partnerships.
- Inform the County Coaching Organiser (CCO) you wish to take part. The CCO for 5. Leicestershire & Rutland can be contacted at lrcaaccodevelopment@gmail.com
- 6. Book onto the module. You can find a course by using the course finder https:// archerygb.org/coaching/find-a-course

I'm interested, who can I chat to?

You can chat to Mick at the club. Mick is a Development (Level 2) coach who is also actively involved in coaching junior and senior county archers or you can speak to any of the active coaches from around the county.

AGB Changes in outdoor Handicaps and Classifications

AGB have announced that changes and updates for outdoor handicaps and classification will take place with effect from 1st April 2023 (start of the outdoor season)

Any previous handicaps and classification will be archived and are no longer valid. This means that every archer will have to shoot at least 3 recognised rounds outdoors during 2023 in order to achieve a recognised handicap.

This will affect competitions as well as awards which will be based on the new system.

There are new age groups for archers which also affects the rounds that need to be shot, e.g over 50s can shoot a shorter distance to achieve the same handicap/classification.

The change has raised several questions which have been fed back to AGB. We await the answers so please bear with us while we try to get a better understanding of these new documents.
