

This year sees AGB membership year run from the day you join, therefore renewal runs from that date. For the majority of club archers, this was a fixed date every year (30th September), so this is a reminder that Archery GB annual insurance fees are due in for these club members.

CLIFF'S BEEN VERY BUSY AGAIN


Cliff has been busy working at the field again, he has fitted vents in the toilet hut to keep it better ventilated.

A PAINFUL REMINDER ABOUT SAFETY AT THE FIELD FROM JON

When I had my beginners course, many years ago, I remember Val Ward saying to all of us 'Whenever you approach the target after shooting, never, ever lean forwards as you will regret it.'

Sound advice, which I completely forgot a few weeks ago, after getting to the boss I bent forwards to pick up the scoresheet, and ended up stabbing myself in the head, boy are those nocks sharp!

The result of my error is shown in the attached photo.

The moral of the story is please be mindful of your own safety when approaching the boss, and probably put the scoresheet to the side and not underneath!!

My thanks to Lyn for her first aid skills in stopping me from bleeding all over the place.





JAMES AT THE UK MASTERS JUNE 2025



In June 2025, I attended the UK Masters. This shoot is invite only for archers that achieved the Master Bowman (MB) ranking in the previous year. The MB scores used to represent the top 4% of UK archers before the classification changes in 2023 made it a little more complex (but it's still fairly similar in standard). This year that meant around 30-50 people in each category.



The event is over two days at Lilleshall National Sports Centre. The Saturday serves as the ranking round with a double WA720 (2 lots of 6 dozen arrows at 122cm face at 70m for recurve, 80cm face at 50m for compound). The Sunday is head to head matches but a bit different to other shoots. Rather than a knockout format, it is repechage head to heads, so you shoot for every position, so in this case, everyone had 6 matches.



The weekend was hot, and Saturday was dry but windy (although nowhere near as windy as many shoots this year), I managed to get two MB scores (I guess validating me being there!) and ranking me 20th.

The Sunday was much calmer with a bit of rain here and there. Compound archers shoot 15 arrows in a match (max score of 15). I had a bye through my first match, for the rest of the matches I was very consistent, with all the scores landing between 141 and 144. With the way that played out, I lost my second match by two points meaning the best I could do for the rest of the day was 17th overall, but winning the next 4 matches meant that I finished in 17th.

Overall, I was happy with how the weekend went, getting two MB scores and winning 4 of my 5 matches I can't really complain! Next time I just need to get the order in which I win my matches correct to get a higher placing!

Thank you James for sharing your experience at the UK Masters shoot and giving us an insight into what goes on at external competitions, its fantastic that you have represented our club and importantly you've done really well too - great job!




Overall I'm happy with my score for the day, I shot a 7.39 arrow average so a score of 533 in total for the National 30.

OUTDOORS AGAIN! DON'T FORGET TO USE SUN SCREEN TOP TIPS TO REMEMBER



- A short training session can last for hours, so get into the habit of being sun prepared before you start any outdoor activity.
- Sunscreen can wear, wash, rub or sweat off, so reapply every two hours or more often when around water.
- To avoid a greasy grip, use a sunscreen applicator or clean palms with a small towel and alcohol gel.
- When removing clothing on a warm day, remember to apply sunscreen to all newly exposed areas of skin.

UK RECORD STATUS FIELD TOURNAMENT



ATTENDED BY CLARE

The field tournament was on the 14th and 15th June near Ipswich, hosted by Gipping Valley Archers. I had attended their practice one day tournament last year, and this year their competition was a UK Record Status one.

The course consisted of 3 loops of 8 targets, 12 marked with distances and 12 unmarked and was set out differently on both days. The target faces ranged from 20cm to 80cm and for my bowstyle, longbow, ranged between a distance of 5m to 50m, at different angles and elevations.

The weather was beautiful on both days and on the first day I had the pleasure of shooting with a fellow longbow archer, Mark Almond, who kindly gave permission for his photographs of us to be used in the newsletter. Being senior longbowers we were shooting from blue peg markers. We were joined by two compound archers who were shooting from the red pegs at each targets. Each group of four archers started at a different target in the morning, and the work party took everyone out onto the course following a safety briefing. Once the klaxon was heard, we were clear to start shooting in double details.





In field competitions depending on the type of target, depends on what you need to do. A single target face is straight forward. However, a triple target requires each archer to shoot in their designated column with one arrow per target face. Once all four archers have shot, double scoring is done by two of the archers, with the other two archers on pulling and sometimes searching for arrows. A notable safety point, is that you always leave an archer in front of the target so if the next group arrives while the rest of the group in deep in the woods searching for lost arrows, they don't start shooting! Any lost arrows are recorded at the target, you follow the marked trail through the forest to the next target and locate your peg - rotating the detail order of shooting.

With this course, after you got to the end of a loop you found yourself back at the tea tent so it was only polite to rest for a few minutes for the compulsory tea and cake, and at the end of the second loop of the day some lunch.

This was only my second field competition and I really enjoyed shooting the unmarked distances which was something I hadn't done before. I suspect it may be a little easier for traditional archery styles than for recurve and compound archers, as we may be a little more used to instinctive aiming.

Definite learnings for me this time around were being able to deal with shooting across patches of bright sunshine and shade, especially if the target is in a substantially different level of illumination to the one you are standing in. Also, how to try and estimate distances if you do not have much in the frame of reference.

The company from other archers on both days was excellent with a lot of encouragement, good humour and generous support. It is a very social form of competition due to the length of the days and the amount of time required to stand and walking together. I had the joy of being in beautiful woodland, got to see some muntjac deer early on Sunday morning and came away with a silver medal...and I only lost 2 arrows!

I would definitely recommend the experience to anyone who wants to try it.

GREAT NEWS!!! The British Police Archery Association have chosen to hold their National Summer Tournament at Lutterworth Archery club. This is a great coup for Lutterworth and may present an opportunity to raise the profile of the club and gain some positive publicity.

The tournament will be held at our field on Sunday 31st August 2025. It will be a Windsor round (60/50/40yds) and is restricted to BPAA members.

There is an opportunity for our members to be involved by volunteering to help in various roles, in addition, members are also welcome to spectate.

The field will need to be set up before the 31st. This will be done during the week preceding so you may find that bosses have been moved and there are various markings on the field. Please do not interfere with these or move the bosses. They will all be returned to their original position during the week following the tournament.

Did you know?

The 2nd oldest archery artefact is 48,000 yrs old.

The arrowheads in South Africa have held the top spot for years but in 2020, a new artefact claimed the No. 2 spot. In 2020, archaeologists discovered arrowheads crafted from animal bone in a rainforest cave in Sri Lanka. They date the arrowheads at a whopping 48,000 years old. We're not referring to just one little point. The excavations in Sri Lanka produced 130 bow arrow tips. That's a lot of archery being practiced!

My first published book 'Reflective Mind' was basically an outlet of my grief after losing my wife, in the hope it would help people in similar situations. I have published 3 books in total to date with all proceeds going to Headway charity.

The walking group and archery club are a very good therapy for loneliness, it helps with meeting people who are sometimes in a similar situation to yourself.

I am now an ambassador for the Headway Leicestershire, Leicester and Rutland charity and raise awareness for the charity whenever I can.

I assume you've noticed my sunshine yellow car, which you can't really miss, the reason I had my car wrapped was to advertise the charity, I did ask special permission to have this done.
