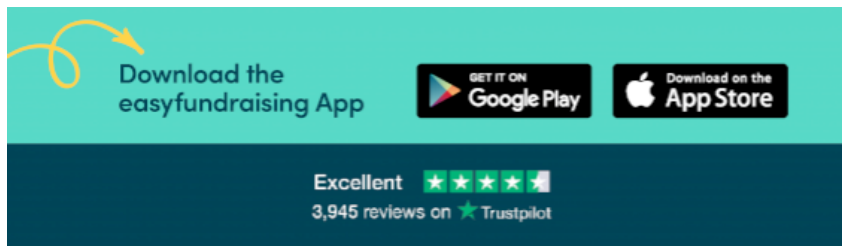

BEGINNERS COURSE 9th & 10th AUGUST



Another successful archery beginners' course was held over the weekend of August 9-10, with a wide variety of people both new to archery and returning to brush up their skills.

Head Coach Mick was in overall charge as always, but the groundwork and hands-on coaching fell to the club's two new coaches, Paul and Jeremy, who thoroughly enjoyed the challenge.



We were lucky with the weather and except for a bit of wind on the second day – which demolished the safety stop net at one point – it was perfect conditions for the course.

These beginners' courses are fairly intense, as over just two days we aim to take a raw beginner, who will probably never have shot a 'proper' bow and arrows before, and turn them into a safe and successful archer able to hit the targets and score some points.

We cover the proper clothing to wear, safety at all levels, physical exercises and warmups, range etiquette, assembling and properly handling one's archery kit, shooting the arrows, and then safely collecting the arrows from the target (with the occasional arrows flying somewhere else and having to be found, of course!).

Our archers learn to shoot both barebow style – the bow has no sights, a very instinctive method of shooting, quite 'Robin Hood' – and Olympic style with sights on the bow, as shot in many major competitions.

The course winds up with a small 'competition' where our archers learn how to score their shots and fill in a proper competition score sheet as they will if they choose to compete when they join a club. It is all very friendly and we don't read out people's scores.

A number of archers in fact rarely enter club competitions, preferring to simply shoot for the enjoyment, physical wellbeing and camaraderie of archery.

Completion certificates were awarded by Mick, and then our newly qualified archers take their often aching muscles back home.

I've not been in Archery very long probably coming up to 5 months, in that time I've just completed my second National 30 Competition and I had an absolutely fantastic day.

Despite new challenges, such as string mishaps, shattering arrow fletchings, losing arrow tips in the hay targets, burning my finger, and playing with superglue. Second time around in competition I was much more relaxed and on track, certainly a much better attempt this time around. Mainly thanks to all of the members and coaches at LAC through constant encouragement and support. And of course all the lovely people who organised the event at Sherwood Archery club and of the other competitors I met along the way so far everyone was just super lovely and welcoming.

Despite my first proper equipment failure at Sherwood I managed to carry on and finish strong. After my first competition I didn't manage to place in the top, hitting a score of 532 in 4th position, which is certainly not a bad start after 3 months. **At Sherwood I managed to win the competition with a staggering 608**, absolutely over the moon with the result.

I was more amazed at the fact that I'd improved so much since the month before, for me this has gone down as my first ever win in sport. I've learnt archery is all about the people, celebrating improvements and supporting each other and above all else having lots of fun.

It wasn't as much about the win for me in Sherwood, it was the fact I built a lot of confidence not only in my ability as an Archer but also in myself. I've found the archery community very welcoming and encouraging. So if you're looking at going to competitions I highly recommend it, you meet a whole range of new people and have loads of fun learning about all the history associated with the art of Archery. A great way to develop some self confidence and make new friends of like minded people. Archery is certainly a sport I aim to stay with for many years!

Thanks again to all of you at LAC for encouraging me and supporting me through all of my achievements so far.

A LITTLE BIT OF BPAA HISTORY

Prior to 1989, there was an organisation called the Police Archery Association (PAA), that catered for members of the Police throughout the UK, to participate in the sport of Archery. The organisation went through various ups & downs and changes of name until in August 2019, Steve Ridley a retired Kent Police Officer and Chairman of the Kent Police Archery Club, became the new Administrator and took over the helm of the Association. His primary brief to turn the fortunes of the organisation around, and to provide advice, and guidance, to UK Police Forces should they wish it, in order to help them set up their own official archery club, where one did not exist.

Once again, another name change, took place and the British Police Archery Association (BPAA) was born.

Membership of the BPAA from 2019 has now been divided into two groups. The first being an official Police Archery Club, with a block membership to our Association. However the BPAA membership also caters for individually joining Police family members, who are also members of their local civilian archery club. Membership of the Association is further based on individuals who are existing archers, who have provided proof of such, and their ability to shoot in a particular bow discipline. As such, our Association has a mixture of members from beginners, right up to National and International standard archers, but the fundamental ethos of the Association, is that all members offer assistance to each other when asked to, in order to improve skill levels and ability, and in so doing raise the standard and standing of the Association in the Archery world. It also aims to further engender an atmosphere of friendship and camaraderie with like-minded individuals, sharing our common interests.

As the Association continues to grow, it offers members the opportunity to shoot against each other within their own regions if they wish to, and also against other outside organisations. These are managed by each regions Regional Representative following the rules and Constitution of the Association. However the "Centre" also runs Tournaments, but as one can appreciate getting members of the Association together from all over the UK is extremely difficult, so most of these shoots generally take the form of Postal events. However the Association does run an Annual National Championship requiring physical attendance at different locations each year around the UK, that members are invited to participate in. Members of the Association also participate in the World Police and Fire Games, and receive invites to the Guernsey National Championships each year

The future is again very promising for the BPAA, and now it has been secured certainly for a few more years to come, but it will only always be as successful as its membership's participation and involvement provides.

Targets were set out at some odd distances so having sight marks wasn't always an advantage. There were various target faces to aim at from Fish to Pool balls and Space Ships to Snakes & Ladders. There were also Archery Darts to have a go at. Each archer shooting 3 arrow ends and moving onto the next boss once the whole team had shot.

Archers were divided into teams of 4 or 5 working together to achieve the best aggregate score. Individual efforts were also recognised. It was good to see so many members at the field and having a go at something different.

Once the "round" was completed, it was into the cabin for tea & cakes whilst the scores were calculated.

The results were:

Best individual score was achieved by **Matthew** - 312

The wooden spoon for lowest score went to **Meg** - 125

The team results were close:

4th place going to '**Our Gang**' (Glynis; Meg; Matthew; Richard & Sharon)
with an average of 211.6

3rd place went to '**All Mixed up**' (Jeremy; Marcus; Bill; John & Lyn)
with an average of 224.8

There was a tie for first place between '**Team Spoon**' (David L; Alex L; Ian & Bryan) and '**Bubble & squeak**' (Martin; Charles; Eleanor & Gaynor)
both teams with an average of 232.25

In order to identify an outright winning team, 'Bubble & Squeak' and 'Team Spoon' were asked to identify 1 archer to go forward for a 1 arrow head to head shoot out on the dart board.

First up was Charles representing Bubble & Squeak. The tension growing, Charles took the shot, - the arrow went into the 'twenty', 20 the score to beat and they thought it was all over! But not so fast! David, representing 'Team Spoon' took his place on the shooting line, the challenge was on, could he do it?..... His arrow flew straight and true and landed in the 'treble twenty'! 60 the score and **the outright winning team declared as 'Team Spoon'**.

Well done everyone who took part, something different and a whole lot of fun.
